DX REPORT de FRANK AA7FM/OH2LVG
Heading the DX report this time is news that
Ghana 9G, now #12 on the most wanted DXCC
list, may be back on the air in 1993. There
has been a long-term ban on amateur radio
activities which is expected to be rescinded
when Ghana reverts to a civilian government in
January. Now it's everyone's guess who of the
Top Gun DXers will beat the pack to reactivate
Ghana.

Another major DX happening would be the activation of Chad (TT8) by WA40BO scheduled for mid-October. My old "vacation" spot, Market Reef (OJO-) will once again be activated by the OH1AF club, also mid-October.

Lebanon, OD, continues to be active as OD5/SP1MHV, who by the way is very efficient at getting the QSL's out. The operators are UN affiliates.

JJ1ZNF has plans to activate Minami Torishima (JD1) until November. If you hear JD1/JD1BFI, however, this one is Ogasawara. They both share the same prefix.

Phoenix area hams have been getting easy Q's from C9RJJ on 40 meters CW (about 7005) from Mozambique, a nice one to have on 40 meters!

Watch for several special events stations commemorating Christopher Columbus, typically bearing the number 500 in their calls. Already announced are C6A500 from Bahama and VP50000 from Grand Turk Island.

CQWW phone contest is coming up October 24-26 (ØØ:ØØ thru ØØ:ØØ UTC). This is a great event to chalk up a lot of new DXCC countries; in fact many dedicated to the contest will easily get their DXCC in this one weekend. Look for PJ9W (Curacao), HC8A (Galapagos), FW/G4DZC (Wallis Island), C6AFT (Bahamas), 4J1F- (MV Island), ZF/W8BLA (Cayman) and many more.

Another fun contest is the Scandinavian Activity Contest. By the time you read this the CW SAC will be history, but there will be time to get in there during the phone contest, scheduled for the weekend of September 26. If you talk to my friend Carl, who will be in the contest as OHØMXY from the Aland/Ahvenanmaa Islands, tell him hello. He has many friends in Phoenix! He was one of the "stars" of Radio-Team Finland's videotape that WVARC members viewed a year ago.

MALYJ VYSOTSKIJ ISLAND EXPEDITION

Frank Smith AA7FM/OH2LVG is heading up an international team of DXers to the rare DXCC island of Malyj Vysotskij ("MV Island") October 22-26, 1992. The operation has been in the planning stages for almost a year and involves one DXer from Mexico, several from Finland and Russia and two from the USA. Among the operators will be Romeo Stepanenko 3W3RR, who is well-known for activating the Spratleys, Myanmar (Burma), Afghanistan and recently Iran. Also onboard is Ed "the Red" Kritsky NT2X, former Soviet citizen now residing in Brooklyn who joined up with several Russian hams to provide radio support to Boris Yeltsin during last year's attempted coup and later wrote about the experience in QST Magazine.

MV Island, referred to a "Ravansaari" by the Finns, is part of the Karelian areas given to the USSR as war reparations following the Winter Wars, and is now leased by Finland from the Russians. It is located about 100 km north of St Petersburg in the Saimaa Canal, slightly southwest of the city of Vyborg.

This operation will use the callsign 4J1FM for CW and 4J1FW for SSB QSO's. The group will also participate in the CQWW SSB contest using a special unannounced call. This operation will be the last ever to use the prefix 4J1- because the prefix is expected to be allocated to Azerbaijan starting in Jan 1993.

Frank will hold up all pileups for a special session with WVARC members only on 22 October (23 October UTC) beginning at 9:00 PM (0400 UTC) on 14240 (+- QRM), SSB, for about one hour. Frank has asked Chuck Bailey W7YU to coordinate this WVARC/4J1FW hour via announcements on the 145.29 repeater.

QSL cards for the operation are via Frank's Finland call OH2LVG. However, WVARC hams are guaranteed personal and "local" attention from AA7FM.

CLUB REPEATERS

Hams monitoring the Sun City West 145.29 MHz repeater recently may have heard on several occasions the brrrp of a series of packet clusters. Investigation by Tom Watts NY7S and Bert Davidson W2GOB indicated that the interference originated with a Mesa ham attempting to communicate with the space shuttle on the uplink frequency 144.700, close to the repeater input frequency. The transmissions were annoying but legal, and were only of short duration.

You are urged to check into, or at least monitor, our Wednesday night 2m net on the SCW repeater. Much news of interest to the ham community is relayed from Newsline, the W5YI Report, ARRL Newsletter and local sources. Time is 6:45 PM.

Also check into the daily 9 AM Call-In net on the same frequency (145.29- MHz). This net was originated to keep track of our shut-ins, and we'd like to hear from more of them, but it also serves to brighten all of our mornings. Join us.

[The following article entitled "What's a Real Ham?" by Brad Williams N6CVF is from the September issue of <u>Worldradio</u>. It is a tribute to club member Betty Henning N7VFW. We thank Dottie Brown K7ESA and Bert Davidson W2GOB for calling it to the editor's attention.]

When no-code was proposed I was one of those quite opposed. Then when it passed, I accepted the fact that Amateur Radio was about to go to pot.

On Jan 19 at about 1300 MST all this changed The tie-rod on my vehicle broke 14 miles out in the desert on a gravel road. My 2m could only hit one repeater some 70 miles away. About the time I was ready to hit the panic button, having received no response to my calls, I received a call from N7VFW, Betty Henning of Peoria, AZ.

Betty turned out to be a newly licensed nocode Tech who proceeded to call the auto club to which I belong. When it appeared that the central dispatch in Phoenix was not getting the job done, Betty called the towing service in Quartzite directly.

Betty stayed with the task of obtaining help. The auto club would only pay for serice on state or county maintained roads, but we were on a BLM road. Another club, Good Samaritan, was contacted and help was obtained. At about 1900 we were "rescued" and Betty was with us via 2m the whole time. It should be noted that this YL had been licensed less than 40 days. She was a little nervous early on, but settled down like a pro.

I learned a lot about Betty during those six hours in the desert. This gal is no spring chicken. In fact, she's confined to a wheel chair but wants to take a whitewater rafting trip down the Feather River, and she's found an outfit that will take her.

In retrospect, how many of us would have undertaken to respond in such a situation during the first 40 days we were licensed? It would appear that no-code can, and does, produce licensees who are Amateur Radio operators in every sense of the word. Miss Betty Henning N7VFW is such a person. I have urged her to learn her code in order that we may keep in touch through HF. Amd I have ordered a subscription to Worldradio for her.

I feel that recognition of Betty's efforts may help other no-coders realize that they too can be true Amateur Radio operators by being of service to others.

BOOK REVIEW de A1 Lee W6KQI "DON WALLACE, W6AM, AMATEUR RADIO'S PIONEER"

At a recent TRW Swap Meet in Manhattan Beach, CA, I saw the book for sale about Don Wallace that is being advertised in many ham publications and decided to make the purchase. Without question, I enjoyed this book more than any book I've read on Amateur Radio.

The reasons! Well, I personally met Don on several occasions since we were both members of the Associated Radio Amateurs of Long Beach and had the pleasure of working W6AM locally and from various locations around the world. In fact, I was especially pleased to find an entire page showing the QSL certificate our club issued when I was the chief operator of GB5QM on board the Queen Mary in 1967. I also knew many of the hams mentioned in the book, but the real reason I recommend it to all of you is for the historical content. It truly covers the history of Amateur Radio as it describes all of Don's life.

The book comes generously supplied with photos of the earliest components and equipment up to the time of his death in 1985. The author, Jan Perkins N6AW, was very close to Don in his later years because Don was so generous in allowing Jan and other DX'ers to use his station for contests. Jan was also helpful in maintaining the station, especially the antennas and feedlines which consisted of 8 rhombics (giving him 16 directions), up to 45 miles of wire on up to 140 acres of land atop 1200 foot Palos Verdes next to LA harbor. station ran a separate kilowatt final on each band and had an elaborate system of specially modified relays for selecting the various antennas while running maximum power.

His fight to achieve and maintain top position as the top DX'er in the world is legendary and well described.

Several pages of QSL cards in full color are included. Chances are that many of the calls will be familiar to you.

I'll be glad to loan my copy of the book to club members if you will contact me by telephone, on the club repeaters or at the club meetings.
